

## About Trempealeau Lakes

In 2009, aided by a donation of land value and grants, MVC purchased the 55-acre Trempealeau Lakes property, with its half-mile of frontage on Second Lake that abuts the state's Trempealeau Lakes State Fishery Area. In addition to the appeal of the chain of spring-fed lakes for fishing, the area is listed on the Great Wisconsin Nature and Birding Trail.



Access to the Upper Mississippi River National Wildlife and Fish Refuge is nearby, including access to its Long Lake Canoe Trail. Trempealeau Lakes is also an easy detour off of the Great River State Trail, part of the Wisconsin DNR Bike 4 Trails system. The property is located entirely within the "Mississippi River—Large River Corridor," identified by Wisconsin's Wildlife Action Plan as being of "Continental Significance." According to Joe Becker, one of the former owners, the area is "loaded with wildlife," and Second Lake is full of springs (for this reason, caution is advised when ice fishing here).



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

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## Trempealeau Lakes

(23671 Pickerel Path—Intersection of Lake Rd & Pickerel Path, Trempealeau, WI)

This ¾-mile flat, wide trail traverses deciduous and pine woods with side trails leading to fishing spots. **Trail may be flooded or wet during spring and other high-water periods.**

**How to get to the trailhead/parking lot from La Crosse:** Follow Hwy 35 (Great River Road) north to Trempealeau. Turn left on unmarked Fremont St (the road to the lock and dam). It becomes Lake Rd near the lock and dam turnoff. Turn left on the next road, unmarked gravel Pickerel Path, and follow it 0.3 mi to a parking place near a canoe/kayak launch and the trailhead.

- 1** Start at the parking area gate and head northwest. You'll pass short side trails to fishing spots, and then the trail turns west on a wide, mowed path through deciduous woods.
- 2** Turn right (north) at a Y in the trail and follow it to **3**, another fishing spot.
- 3** Turn left (west) for a walk through a cathedral-like pine forest. Watch for stumps in the path!
- 4** At another MVC gate (an additional parking spot), turn left (east) to return to the Y at **2** and veer right (east) to return to the parking area. Instead, you may exit to Pickerel Path at **4** and follow it east to the parking area.
